DECEMBER BOARD NOTES

The regular monthly meeting of the Board of Directors was held December 8 at the Oakwood Glen Park. Directors present were Ron Baalman, Charlie Thomas, David Gleason, Greg Johnson, Liz McNinch, and Jule Crider, along with Community Manager Stella Walleck.

Our Constable reported on several incidents in the subdivision during the past month and emphasized the need for residents to report any suspicious activities or persons. Call the Constable at 376-3472.

The Deed Restrictions Committee reported 23 violations, 5 of which required legal action. Court dates have been set for February for two cases.

Greg Johnson reported that the replastering of the pool has been completed and a new diving board installed. The bathhouse has had extensive electrical repairs and resurfacing of the tennis courts has also been completed.

Lein Committee reported that several lots had not been billed for past years' maintenance fees due to an oversight. Transfers of these properties had not been recorded. These fees would be due from the new owners.

The following motions were approved: \$50 was allocated for the Christmas Caroling Activity on December 21. \$50 was approved for the purchase of 1988 Christmas Decorations for use at the subdivision entrances. 30 hours of overtime for constable service was approved.

To show appreciation for their contributions to our community, the Board approved the purchase of plaques for past Board members Terry Alcott and Paul Pacior.

Mr. Fred Nichols was elected to the Board to complete the term of Paul Pacior. There were no other names in nomination.

The following positions were filled: Greg Johnson, Vice-President; Liz McNinch, Secretary; Charlie Thomas, Lein Committee Chairman.

All bids had not yet been received for contracts up for renewal, so voting on awarding of contracts was postponed.

The next regular monthly meeting of the Board of Directors will be on January 12, 7:30 PM. All residents are welcome to attend.

HAVE YOU RECEIVED YOUR ACORN?

Chances are good that you have, if you are reading this, of course. And the reason you have is that a lot of people in the subdivision contribute time to putting together and distributing a monthly newsletter.

For those that wonder how it appears on your door each month (come on, there must be SOMEONE who wondered that!), this is how it works: The Editor of the Acorn puts together any materials turned in to her by the 10th of each month, including committee announcements, Road notes, classifieds, etc., as well as any news of interest gleaned elsewhere. This material is typed, edited, and prioritized, when sent to JSJ Publishing. JSJ sets, lays out, and prints the Acorn, occasionally adding filler materials. JSJ is not paid by Oakwood Glen but sells the advertising you see to cover their expenses.

Usually about the first of the month, the completed Acorns are delivered to Liz McNinch, our Distribution Co-ordinator. Liz then counts out and distributes the Acorn to block captains in Section II. She also delivers a bundle to Marlene Richards who takes care of getting them to block captains in Section I. Each block captain then distributes the Acorns door-to-door on their block, and there is your newsletter!
