Believe it or not, summer is quickly approaching, and soon you'll be lounging around the pool. The management team of Greater Houston Pool Management, Inc. is delighted to be returning to Oakwood Glen.

Our goal every summer is best defined by our mission statement: **SAFETY IS OUR #1 PRIORITY!!!** We are also committed to treating our customers with a pleasant and courteous service, as they enjoy their clean swimming environment. We feel communication is the key. Please don't hesitate to contact our office at anytime concerning our service (713) 771-POOL.

To help assure a safe and fun summer for everyone, Greater Houston Pool Management would like to remind you of a few facility and safety reminders:

1. Parents must closely supervise their children at all times. Remember, it only takes seconds for a child to drown.
2. Don't allow children to play with or around the main drain. The main drain suction can be very powerful, and has been known to cause severe injuries, and in some cases death.
3. The safety of the children in the baby pool are the parents or guardians responsibility. The lifeguards will always enforce the pool rules throughout the facility, but children who cannot swim must have an adult within arms reach at all times. The same rule applies even if the child is wearing a flotation device.
4. Define a safe zone for your children where they can always touch

the bottom. One of the most common saves a lifeguard must make is when a swimmer strays to an area that is too deep for them to stand.

5. Do not dive in areas marked "NO DIVING". Nearly 90 percent of all spinal injuries occur in the shallow end of the pool.
6. Breath holding games can be very dangerous and may cause cardiac arrhythmia or seizures. Games like who can hold their breath the longest, and swimming the longest distance underwater should be avoided at all times.
7. Pool passes will be strictly enforced. It is the member's responsibility to bring them to the pool. It is a very awkward and uncomfortable situation for everyone, when the lifeguard must ask a member to go back home to get his or her pool pass.
8. Remember that there are several different types of people who like to use the pool throughout the summer. Both young and old, everyone wants to have a good time.
9. If you should ever have a question about the pool rules, ask a lifeguard or manager. It is better to be safe then sorry!!!
10. Have a safe and enjoyable summer.

TEXAS "LIVING WILL" INFORMATION

With recent news articles on living wills, all of us need to know what to do here in Texas to locate and validate such a document if we so desire.

The Houston Chronicle, in a column by Ronald Lipman advises:

You can obtain the form on the Internet by visiting www.capitol.state.tx.us. In Texas, a living will is actually called a Directive to Physicians and Family or Surrogates.

Once there, click on Statutes and then on Health & Safety Code. The form is contained in Section 166.033. Most hospitals will give you

free copies as well.

The Directive to Physicians does not need to be notarized. It does, however, need to be signed by two adult witnesses and at least one of them can't be related to you by blood or marriage and can't be a person you have named in a medical power of attorney to make medical decisions for you. -Staff Reporter

MAY BOARD MEETING

The May Board Meeting was held at 7PM on May 10th in the Back Park. Eighteen residents and 7 board directors attended.

Long time resident and realtor, Carl Mattaliano, introduced himself and advised all attending that even with the boom in new home building in the area, "Oakwood Glen is still the premiere neighborhood with homes in the low 100,000 price range close to Klein High School." He underlined the importance of maintaining yards and houses to keep our property values up.

Constable Truck Diaz gave the monthly statistics. (See separate report.) Questioned on the April 29th sighting of the Channel 2 News helicopter and proximity of multiple police sirens, he was able to inform all that a high-speed chase that started elsewhere, ended safely in the 17300 block of Seven Pines.

Items Discussed:

1. The Board will actively pursue owners of vacant houses that are falling in disrepair.
2. Proposal and passage of a 4th of July Parade-see lead article.
3. Roof repair finished at pool

building.

4. New, updated electrical wiring completed at Front Park.
5. Painting of Pool Building awarded to Gonzalez Contracting- See Freshly Painted Building
6. Consolidated Management will reissue laminated Pool Tags to residents submitting summer Pool Registration Forms. Lifeguards will not have to use a notebook system for entrance, as that would take attention away from their primary job of Pool Safety.
7. Pest Arrest submitted a proposal for termite and insect treatment.
8. Houston Pool Co. will be getting more bids for additional pool furniture.

There was a general discussion on formulating an Overall Plan of Improvements for the subdivision. Discussion issues included:

- a. Hiring an independent inspector or architect to advise us on improving our Back Park Facility in manageable stages. The building there is 25 years

old and needs updating and renovation.

- b. Sidewalk repair and ADA compliant curb cuts (similar to what they are doing in Memorial Northwest).
- c. A computerized key lock system for the Front Park.

One resident voiced concern on the driving school customarily using our neighborhood for practice. The roads in OWG are public roads but a letter will be sent asking them to share this experience with nearby neighborhoods. -Staff Reporter

JUNE RECIPE CORNER

“Better Homes and Gardens” familiar red gingham check cookbook, thirty-four years used, still offers a basic, fast entrée that the whole family enjoys.

Porcupine Meatballs

1 lb. Ground beef 3/4 cup uncooked long-grain rice 1 slightly beaten egg
 1 Tbsp. Snipped parsley 1/2 tsp. Salt Dash pepper 1 (10 ¾ oz.) tomato soup
 1/2 cup water 1 Tsp. Worcestershire sauce

Combine meat, rice, egg, parsley, salt, pepper and 1/4 cup condensed tomato soup. Mix thoroughly; shape in about 10-15 balls and place in skillet. Mix remaining soup, water and Worcestershire sauce; pour over meatballs. Bring to boil; reduce heat; cover and simmer 40 minutes, stirring often. Makes 4-5 servings. M. Harris

SOMETHING MISSING

The garden sits decorated and waiting for visitors. The cobalt blue salvia sways in the breeze and the passionflower vine trails exotic purple blooms. The garden angel stands ready to greet company. A bee arrives but the guests of honor are no shows-AWOL from the social scene. Where is the flash of orange and black wings that flutter on the backdrop of green leaves and petal props? The Monarchs are missing, dwindling in number thanks to development devouring open land where milkweed and nectar plants provided a food source. New herbicide-resistant crops have farmers spraying chemicals that kill weeds and wipe out butterfly habitats. “We are going to lose this population unless we do something,” says University of Kansas professor, Orley Taylor.

Professor Taylor is an expert on the Monarchs and their plight. He started a national effort to create 10,000 Monarch way stations in the next 3 years. A way station is simple to set up in back yards, schools, nature centers, and zoos. It consists of planting milkweed and nectar plants so Monarchs can lay their eggs and the larvae when hatched can eat the milkweed leaves. Adult butterflies feed on the nectar from flowers nearby. “Any number of plants helps, but the more the better,” advises Prof. Taylor. Between 10 and 20 plants per garden is the goal. Nectar plants include: phlox, azaleas, butterfly weed, sedum, and purple coneflowers.

The Monarch butterfly population was at its peak in 1996. Besides growth and chemical spraying, winter storms and illegal logging in Mexico have contributed to their decline. Last summer’s cool temperatures saw the butterfly population shrink to one-tenth the number counted in 1996.

Texas claims the Monarch, as it’s official insect. Let’s all pitch in and help these fragile wonders survive so once again they can be the life of our summer garden parties. -M. Harris -Source: Houston Chronicle Article.

Oakwood Glen Articles of Incorporation:

ARTICLE VII

15. No trucks, trailers, boats or any vehicle other than passenger cars will be permitted to park on streets or on drives in front of residence for longer than a forty-eight hour period.
