We all watched the scenes of New Orleans and the devastation that was visited on the people there. Two of our community leaders searched the surrounding hotels and motels for families that had evacuated ahead of the storm. They found several great families, extended families, husbands and wives, with fathers and mothers, brothers and sisters. These were families that had homes and jobs in New Orleans, they had sufficient money to stay at the hotel for a short period of time. Their thinking was that when the storm passed they would return to New Orleans and their lives.

2 When they did return they found that everything that they had was gone, their house, their jobs and this impacted not only them but their extended families as well. I thought about the process of leaving your home for a storm thinking that you would re-

turn, repair and pick up the pieces but I never thought about having nothing to return to. The members of this community spent time, energy and money to aid these families. Carrie Fraleigh, Elana Davenport and Maureen Harris together with numerous other girl scout mothers, worked tirelessly to find clothes, food and shelter for these families. So far all have been placed in homes and apartments. One family, with 3 children, got my attention. These are hardworking honest people who had lives and futures in New Orleans that they thought they would be returning to until the pictures on the television showed that there was nothing to go back to. I wanted to help this family and brought the matter to the board. With the support of the board,

by unanimous vote we decided that helping one family was something we could do. We have numerous rental houses in this community. One of those houses is across the street from me and had 4 bedrooms. This home would be perfect for this hard working family. It was voted that the Association, your Association, would rent this house until the end of the year so the family and the children could get registered in school and try to re-build their lives. I will be applying to FEMA for reimbursement of as much of the rent as we can get. Other members of the community are picking up the tab for utilities and we are asking for contributions from our members, voluntary, which can be used to help this family rebuild a future. If you would like to contribute

The husband and father of this family want to stay here and start their own business, if you have general work around the house, clean up debris, painting, small repairs, carpentering needs please contact me and I will have them get in touch with you. I want to finish painting the clubhouse and will be presenting to the board the idea that we have Jerome Jones and his dad provide the labor. Thank you all for your support and your kindness to all of the evacuees from New Orleans.

SEPTEMBER BOARD MEETING

Date: September 13 Time: 7PM Place: Back Park

The September board meeting was attended by all directors and 14 residents. First order of business was The Constable Report by Constable Truck Diaz. (See separate article.) Before serious discussions began, President Hill noted the new interior paint colors of "sumptuous peach," "chrysanthemum" and trim of "alluring white." Volunteers helped John Hill do the actual painting. The Club House at the moment is filled with donations of clothing, shoes, furniture and food that our Girl Scouts and OWG homeowners have collected to distribute to Hurricane Katrina evacuees.

President Hill commended our Girl Scout leaders, Carrie Fraleigh and Elana Davenport for initiating and directing a monumental neighborhood assistance program that now involves dozens of volunteers currently assisting 14 families Hurricane Katrina survivors. (See separate article for details.) The Board, in keeping with this spirit of generosity and desire to help, voted unanimously to underwrite rental of a lease home in our subdivision. This will be done with a written contract and the family will reimburse our Homeowner's upon receipt of federal assistance money.

Other matters residents voiced concern on:

- 1. J&S Trash Service-Complaints on them leaving a trail of debris on the streets on pick up days. This will be investigated.
- 2. Pool Conditions this Season-Lifeguards and pool cleanliness a concern. Discussion continues on exploring alternative options for next summer.
- 3. Director Lira announced that dramatic improvements are ongoing at "the dentist office" near our subdivision entrance.
- 4. September 16th a Budget Committee will meet at the Back Park at 7PM. The fiscal year runs Jan.-Dec. but assessment bills start going out in October. This year alone there is a total of \$23,000 in unpaid assess-

ment fees. Issues on budgetary items and time and payment arrangements of fees will be discussed. Details will follow in future Acorn.

The proposed Bylaw changes have been received from our attorney. This proposal with a cover letter explaining changes will be mailed to all homeowners. The Board wants **EVERYONE** to have "ample opportunity" to review and ask questions. The goal is to have no confusion when voting as this will be the legal document governing our community on file with the county. Come to the October Board meeting if you have questions. *****The proxy for voting at the NOVEMBER ANNUAL MEETING will include the vote on the Bylaws and three open board positions.**

Other business:

Card key system still in bid stage.

Fountains need repair and possible replacement at Front Park and Back Park. This is being evaluated.

Discussion on continued adult use of the pool after school starts. -Staff Reporter

The other day my husband encountered a very angry red wasp that decided to defend his turf at the paper-recycling bin. I can't say size won, as a big red welt almost immediately appeared and caused a grown man to flee the scene.

What to do to help ease the pain? First thing, find Benedryl, next thought check the Internet for some sort of hint on quick relief.

Yes, Mother Earth News.com! Subject: Bees and other Bugs.

"Let's start with the bee or wasp sting you didn't count on but now have. Two simple remedies are effective, depending on the type of sting. If it's a bee sting, prepare a paste of baking soda and water and apply to the area. Bee stings contain formic acid, so and alkaline baking soda helps to neutralize them. If on the other hand you've been stung by a wasp, reach for some vinegar. Vinegar contains acetic acid and will help to neutralize the wasp's more alkaline sting."

LENDING A HAND

Last month I wrote an article for The Acorn on "A Global Lesson." It was what we all could learn from a recent news story about countries uniting to save seven Russian sailors trapped on a mini sub in the Bering Sea. I never imagined several weeks later that the worst natural disaster any of us have ever seen would occur here along the Gulf Coast.

All of us watched in stunned disbelief as Mother Nature all but wiped out New Orleans and severely damaged other parts of Louisiana, Alabama and Mississippi. As expected, criticism and finger pointing came quickly. Countering this knee jerk reaction, an unprecedented national outreach and desire to lend a hand caught hold and even now continues to spread. Red Cross donations have poured in and will hopefully be dispersed to all that need financial assistance. We can be proud that our home state of Texas has taken the lead and put out the welcome mat to people impacted by Katrina. Houston has been a shining example of what big hearts can do when put to the test.

This spirit of generosity, I am glad to report, is very evident here in Oakwood Glen. Girl Scout leader, Carrie Fraleigh, is leading our own community involvement. She reached out and discovered a large group of evacuees from New Orleans staying at Spring Travel Lodge. Through her efforts and call to action, members of Girl Scout Troop 11119 provided meals and started our neighborhood drive for essential items such as food and clothing. The Back Park Clubhouse, for the moment, resembles a way

station for the Salvation Army. Word of our combined relief efforts has spread and relatives, faraway friends, adjacent subdivisions and churches in the area have located furniture, toys, household goods and school supplies. Carrie's Girl Scouts hosted a picnic at the Back Park so all the evacuees could relax away from the confines of cramped motel rooms. Those of us helping got to meet these folks and hear their stories. Most in this group left on the first call for evacuation. They had done it before; they knew the drill. They had a plan, packed a change of clothes and toothbrush. Helplessly they watched the devastation play out hour-by-hour, day-by-day, 24/7, as the levees collapsed and water washed away their homes, livelihoods and lifetimes. Family members in this group are still missing. Days now are spent making phone calls searching for relatives, filling out countless forms for FEMA and Red Cross, and ultimately deciding to stay in place or make their way back to rebuild. Those of us trying to help urged going to the downtown shelters where experts could clarify and expedite the assistance process. None chose to leave this area. Trust has been placed in hands that initially reached out in the darkness.

Lending a hand through our community has been contagious. A chain of one hand reaching out has been quickly caught and held by another ready to give. Churches like Champion Baptist, Resurrection Lutheran, Spring Tabernacle, and St. Dunstan's Episcopal have all joined us. Friends nearby and far away have sent gift cards, donated funds for appliances and still scour the area for permanent homes and updated assistance information. Some have even stepped up and miraculously located and reunited one mother here with her children who had been separated and living at a shelter in Natchez, Mississippi.

Efforts continue and we all

know there is no overnight fix for this Mother lode of misery. Oakwood Glen has helped one family move into a rental home in OWG, another family is in Cypressdale and still others will be moving into Spring Oaks Apartments. Children are getting back to normalcy and are attending Klein Schools.

These survivors are a true microcosm of New Orleans. They are proud, hard working people who want to somehow express their gratitude. One man who has found a home is ready to move furniture in his truck anytime we need him. Others, who know the secret of a good roux, plan on gumbo parties for all their Texas friends. It is more than enough—we are humbled by the trust and faith they have placed in us.

No other subdivision that I know of in the area has made such a concerted effort to reach out. I am so proud of this community and my neighbors for all they have done and continue to do to share the burden and ease the pain. Given our geographical position, it could have been us. I have seen Oakwood Glen rise to other challenges, and as always we are the volunteers, the front line, and the first to lend a hand. —M.Harris-

Oatmeal Cookies-3 Dozen

| 1 cup butter | 1 cup white sugar | 1 /2 cup brown sugar | 1 egg-beaten |
| 1 tsp. Vanilla | 1+1/ 2 cups flour | 1 tsp. Baking soda | 1 tsp. Cinnamon |
| 1+1/ 2 cups quick Quaker Oatmeal | | 1/ 2 cup chopped nuts* | |
| 1 cup coconut | | 1/4 cup chocolate chips | |

Oven-350 degrees. Cream first three ingredients, and then add egg and vanilla. Sift together next three ingredients and add to butter and egg mixture. Add rest of ingredients. Chill 1 hour or more. Form rounded teaspoons of dough on cookie sheet. Butter bottom of a glass and dip in white sugar. Flatten cookies. Bake approximately 10 minutes. *Pecans are the best s to use, but you can use walnuts. -M.Harris

October Gardening

October means we just might get a cool front as we go into the fall planting season. Pansies are the all around favorite annual for this time of year. They will bloom from the day they are planted until the end of April even if we receive a number of days with freezing temperatures. Pansies are much more sensitive to hot weather than they are to cold, that is why it is recommended they not be planted until after November 1. Pansies are offered in a number of varieties. They are shade tolerant but bloom best in full sun.

Butterflies utilize pansies. It is a good idea to apply slug bait at planting time and every two weeks. Use these monkey-faced and clear-faced bloomers for massed plantings of the same color in containers. When considering color selection, remember brighter colors are easier seen from a distance and the solid blues are best viewed up close.

When planting use soil that drains well. Add a bit of compost and bone meal for best results. Snip off spent blossoms to encourage continued flowering. Use fertilizer with a high middle number once a month and these pretties will brighten your garden even on the gloomiest day. From plantanswers.com-Staff Reporter


